ELEMENTARY - MIDDLE SCHOOL

Summer school attendance is highly recommended for students who score basic or minimal on standardized tests and/or who need additional support in academic content areas.

A Regional Site Plan is used for elementary summer school so schools collaborate together to offer summer school. Students may register for any open elementary site although are encouraged to attend the assigned regional elementary site school.

The scheduling of students for summer school courses will depend on the enrollment of students at each open site. Please contact the site where you wish to enroll your student to find out which classes are scheduled.

Elementary and Middle School Summer School Sessions

- Summer school is held from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M., unless otherwise noted.
- Summer school duration is 24-days

General Registration Information:

All students must register to attend. Registration and Health Information Forms are located on the KUSD Summer School website or are available at your child's school. Students in Kindergarten through fourth grades are encouraged to attend their assigned regional elementary site school but may attend any site. Students in grades five through seven should attend their 2012 – 2013 middle school due to the nature of the educational program. Parent requests to attend a different middle school site will be considered if room is available.

Registration for summer school courses is on a first-come, first-serve basis, and takes place in person at the student's home school. A limited number of seats are available for each site. Registration begins April 16.

Summer School Attendance Policy:

Absences: Students will be allowed a total of four absences, including excused as well as those that are not excused. Any unexcused absences could result in dismissal from the Summer School program. Parents/Guardians must call the school to report all absences in order for the absence to be considered excused. Any vacation time should be prearranged to ensure that the student has sufficient time to complete any required work.

Tardiness: The student and the parent/guardian share responsibility for preventing student tardiness. If excessive tardiness is a problem, a parent conference will be held. Please note that if a student is more than 30 minutes late to any class, it will be counted as one-half day unexcused absence in the four-hour session and a full absence in the two-hour session.

Behavior and Dress:

All school rules and regulations that are enforced during the regular school year apply during summer school. Two behavioral referrals and/or major disciplinary problems may be grounds for removal from the summer school program. Parents/Guardians will be notified by a telephone call or mail of any referrals involving the student.

Getting Ready for Kindergarten and First Grade:

Most elementary regional sites will be offering the “Getting Ready” classes for kindergarten and first-grade. Classes are usually offered in two-hour sessions. Scheduling is dependent on enrollment. Please contact the open elementary site at which you wish to enroll your child for more information. Registration forms may be returned to the child’s home schools.

Please note: Getting Ready Classes will be held only if there is sufficient enrollment.

Getting Ready for Kindergarten: This class is designed to develop the confidence of students entering Kindergarten. The class focuses on the language, motor, and social skills necessary to succeed in kindergarten. A variety of academic activities will be used to help prepared students for Kindergarten. The activities will include stories, music, art, and cooperative games.

Getting Ready for First Grade: A variety of activities will be used to strengthen and improve the academic and social skills of kindergarteners to better prepare them for first grade. The activities will focus mainly on reading, writing, and math skills.

Academic Enrichment Mathematics and Reading for Grades 1 - 4

This program will focus on meeting the personalized learning needs of all students. Based on individual student need, various math and literacy skills will be targeted through engaging problem-based learning experiences.

Academic Enrichment Mathematics:

Academic enrichment mathematics focuses on improving student skills in computation, number sense, and problem solving through a variety of activities. Students will experience a prescribed curriculum designed to help them meet the math benchmarks specified at their grade level. Math activities, which integrate reading, will be incorporated into the curriculum

Academic Enrichment Reading: Academic Enrichment Reading will focus on developing inferential comprehension, one of the most essential strategies used by good readers and writers. Instruction will be provided to accommodate the student's learning styles and needs and will incorporate a variety of teaching strategies. Students will work on increasing reading stamina. Reading outside of class will be encouraged.

Forward Progress for Grade 5:

This program will focus on meeting the personalized learning needs of all students. To ease the transition into middle school, fifth-grade students will attend **Forward Progress** classes at their fall 2012 middle school buildings instead of at the elementary school sites.

Registration should be completed at the child's home school. The scheduling of students for reading and/or math will depend on the enrollment of students at each school. There is no summer school enrollment fee for these classes.

Forward Progress Mathematics

Fifth-grade students enrolled in Forward Progress will be provided instruction and resources that students need to be successful at the middle school level. Instruction will be provided to accommodate the student's skill level and learning style and will incorporate a variety of media and teaching strategies.

Forward Progress Reading

Forward Progress reading and language arts will focus on developing inferential comprehension, one of the most essential strategies used by good readers and writers. Instruction will be provided to accommodate the student's learning styles and needs and will incorporate a variety of teaching strategies. Students will work on increasing reading stamina. Reading outside of class will be encouraged.

Extended-Year Reading and Mathematics for Grades 6 and 7:

Extended-Year Reading: Extended-Year reading will focus on developing inferential comprehension, one of the most essential strategies used by good readers and writers. Instruction will be provided to accommodate the student's learning styles and needs and will incorporate a variety of teaching strategies. Students will work on increasing reading stamina. Reading outside of class will be encouraged.

Extended-Year Mathematics: Extended-Year math focuses on will focus on reading, interpreting and organizing data, as well as solving problems and drawing conclusions based on data. Instruction is designed to help students meet math benchmarks specified at their grade level. Math activities, which integrate reading and writing, will be incorporated into the curriculum.

Early Start for Grade 8:

To ease this transition for students attending the Summer School in math and reading, eighth-grade students will attend classes called “**Early Start**” at high school buildings. Students attending Bradford, Indian Trail or Tremper in fall will be enrolled at those sites. Students attending any of the other high schools in fall will attend their resident school. The Early Start course consists of academic components in both math and reading.

Registration and health forms should be returned to your child's current middle school as soon as possible to ensure course availability. The scheduling of students for Early Start will depend on the enrollment of students at each school. There is no summer school enrollment fee for these classes.

Students successfully completing the Early Start course will receive one-half (.5) elective credit toward high school graduation.

Early Start Introduction to Algebra 1A: This component offers students a variety of opportunities for engaging in activities that eases the transition to Algebra. A consistent lesson format enhances the gradual development of skills and concepts. Special problem-solving application lessons will provide a meaningful approach to understanding Algebra. With practice review and the use of manipulatives, students are introduced to the concepts of Algebra 1.

Early Start Introduction to Composition: This component builds on the knowledge acquired in middle school and sets a foundation for the students' literature and writing skills used in high school. Early Start Introduction to Composition focuses on a theme based approach, which assists in developing the most essential strategies used by good readers: inferring, synthesizing, visualizing, asking questions, determining importance, make connections, and using “fix-up” strategies.

Special Education Life, Learning, and Leisure Program

This is a summer program for special education students, ages 6 to 21, who have been identified with significant developmental delays. The program is designed to enhance self-care skills, learning opportunities, recreational activities and social development in the community and school setting. It provides experiences to promote learning, self-esteem, and positive peer interaction.

A \$30 fee will be charged for each child. Registration will be taken at your child's school office. Fees ***must*** be paid at the time of registration. Each registration requires the student's special education teacher's signature. Registration ends when the program reaches capacity.

All sites follow the elementary summer school calendar. Program runs from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
