The meeting was called to order at 6:01 P.M. with the following members present: Mrs. R. Stevens, Mr. Fountain, Mr. Bryan, Mrs. Snyder, Mrs. Taube and Mrs. P. Stevens. Dr. Mangi was also present. Mr. Ostman arrived later.

- Mrs. P. Stevens, President, opened the meeting by announcing that this was a special meeting of the School Board of the Kenosha Unified School District No. 1. Notice of this special meeting was given to the public by forwarding a copy of the notice to all requesting radio stations and newspapers.
- Mrs. P. Stevens announced that an executive session had been scheduled to follow this special meeting for the purpose of Board Deliberations or Negotiations for Investing Public Funds; Review of Findings/Orders of Independent Hearing Officers; Personnel: Problems, Position Assignments, and Compensation and/or Contracts; and Collective Bargaining Deliberations.

REGULAR MEETING OF THE KENOSHA UNIFIED SCHOOL BOARD HELD DECEMBER 15, 2009

A regular meeting of the Kenosha Unified School Board was held on Tuesday, December 15, 2009, at 7:00 P.M. in the Board Room of the Educational Support Center. Mrs. P. Stevens, President, presided.

The meeting was called to order at 7:07 P.M. with the following Board members present: Mrs. R. Stevens, Mr. Fountain, Mr. Bryan, Mrs. Snyder, Mr. Ostman, Mrs. Taube and Mrs. P. Stevens. Dr. Mangi was also present.

Mrs. P. Stevens, President, opened the meeting by announcing that this was a regular meeting of the School Board of Kenosha Unified School District No. 1. Notice of this regular meeting was given to the public by forwarding the complete agenda to all requesting radio stations and newspapers. Copies of the complete agenda are available for inspection at all public schools and at the Superintendent's office. Anyone desiring information as to forthcoming meetings should contact the Superintendent's office.

Dr. Mangi presented the United Hospital System Medical Outreach Services Award, the Kenosha Tremper Girls' Soccer Team Award, and the Educator Trailblazer Award.

There were no Administrative or Supervisory Appointments.

Mrs. P. Stevens introduced the Student Ambassador, Lauren Calmet, from Bradford High School and she made her comments.

Mr. Johnston gave the Legislative Report.

Views and comments were expressed by members of the public and Board members made their responses and/or comments.

Dr. Mangi gave the Superintendent's report.

The Board then considered the following Consent-Approve items:

Consent-Approve item XI-A – Recommendations Concerning Appointments, Leaves of Absence, Retirements and Resignations as presented in the agenda.

Consent-Approve item XI-B – Minutes of the 11/24/09 and 12/01/09 Special Meetings and Executive Sessions and the 11/24/09 Regular Meeting.

Consent-Approve item XI-C – Summary of Receipts, Wire Transfers and Check Registers submitted by Mrs. Eileen Coss, Accounting Manager; Mr. William Johnston, Executive Director of Business; and Dr. Mangi, excerpts follow:

"It is recommended that receipt numbers CR041079 through CR041696 that total \$423,320.96 be approved.

Check numbers 441411 through 442905 totaling \$9,689,446.71 are recommended for approval as the payments made are within budgeted allocations for the respective programs and projects.

It is recommended that wire transfers to First National Bank of Chicago and Nations Bank dated November 2, 5, 16, 19, and 23, 2009 totaling \$3,983,744.16; to US Bank of Milwaukee dated November 3, 13, 17, and 27, 2009 totaling \$591,646.51 and to the Wisconsin Retirement System dated November 30, 2009 totaling \$1,185,722.53 be approved."

Mr. Fountain moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. Mr. Ostman seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

The Resolution Authorizing the Issuance and Awarding the Sale of \$11,660,000 General Obligation Qualified School Construction Promissory Notes, Series 2010A (Tax Credit) was pulled from the agenda.

Dr. Mangi presented the Youth Options Program Appeal submitted by Mr. Greg Wright, Career & Technical Education Coordinator; Mrs. Vickie Brown-Gurley, Executive Director of Instructional Services; and Dr. Mangi, excerpts follow:

"A LakeView Technology Academy parent is appealing to the Kenosha Unified School Board to allow a Carthage College course to be approved for Youth Options even though the Wisconsin DPI State Report form PI-8700-A was not turned in by the October 1st state deadline. The parent and her son have sent a new YOP form to KUSD for consideration of funding for a four credit Japanese course at Carthage College at a cost of over \$1,200, including tuition and books.

Administration recommends that the School Board not approve the appeal to allow and pay for a new course that was not on the Youth Options form PI-8700-A by the October 1 deadline. If the board approves this appeal, it will set a precedent for future appeals and be contrary to the state statutes and administrative code. More importantly, such a ruling will open up the school board for potential future financial liability and possibly for prior appeals that were denied by the District."

Mrs. Taube moved to not approve the appeal to allow and pay for a new course that was not on the Youth Options form PI-8700-A by the October 1 deadline. Mrs. R. Stevens seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

Dr. Mangi presented the WASB Resolutions submitted by Mr. Johnston and Dr. Mangi, excerpts follow:

"The Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB) has developed positions on key policy issues that are forwarded to the State Legislature annually. These positions are developed through a continuous review process coordinated by the WASB Policy and Resolutions Committee.

During the fall of each year, the Committee solicits input on significant policy issues from many sources, including those submitted by school district boards and at the fall regional meetings. In November each year, the Committee reviews the material and begins the selection process to formalize the policy positions for the current year. These WASB positions on policy issues are presented and generally decided by the WASB Delegate Assembly, which meets annually in Milwaukee during the WASB-WASDA-WASBO State Education Convention in January. The WASB Delegate Assembly is comprised of one (1) representative from each WASB member school board. Those positions that are approved at the Delegate Assembly are added to the overall WASB resolution document presented to the State Legislature at the beginning of each legislative session.

Administration has reviewed the attached 2010 recommended resolutions from the WASB Policy and Resolutions Committee and concludes that there is no reason why the Board of Education should not support all of these positions. It should be noted that several of the proposed resolutions are to clarify the education community's position on some of the legislative changes made in the last biennial budget, as well as, the legislative changes to allow Wisconsin to be eligible for the federal "Race to the Top" funds. Included in these resolutions are positions on teacher arbitration limits and providing the local school boards the ability to select the healthcare insurance provider.

There is also a resolution reaffirming the desire to continue requiring the election of school board members in non-partisan elections to be held in the spring. The State Legislative is considering proposals to change all non-partisan elections to the fall election.

Administration recommends that the Board of Education review the attached resolutions and authorize the Board's delegate to the WASB Delegate Assembly to vote in favor of these resolutions."

Mrs. Snyder moved to allow the Board's delegate to the WASB Delegate Assembly to vote in favor of the resolutions except for Resolutions 10-6 through 10-12. Mrs. R. Stevens seconded the motion. Mrs. Taube moved to amend the motion to also exclude Resolution 10-5. Mrs. Snyder and Mrs. R. Stevens accepted the motion as amended. Unanimously approved.

Dr. Mangi presented the Approval of Classification, Compensation and Personnel Policy for General Administrative, Instructional Administrative, Supervisory and Technical Personnel 2009-2011 submitted by Dr. Mangi, excerpts follow:

"Several members of the Board of Education met with representatives from the Kenosha School Administrators Association (KSAA). Through dialogue, there was tentative agreement to changes in the Policy including language regarding health insurance, retirement benefits and compensation.

It is recommended that the Board of Education ratify the proposed changes to the AST Classification, Compensation and Personnel Policy for 2009-10 and 2010-11."

- Mr. Fountain moved to approve the Classification, Compensation and Personnel Policy for General Administrative, Instructional Administrative, Supervisory and Technical Personnel 2009-2011. Mr. Ostman seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.
 - Mr. Fountain presented the Donations to the District as provided in the agenda.
- Mr. Fountain moved to approve the Donations to the District as presented. Mr. Ostman seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

WAIVER OF POLICY 1330 USE OF SCHOOL DISTRICT FACILITIES

The Kenosha Cyclones Fastpitch Club, a registered 501(c)3 organization, is requesting a waiver of user fees for use of the Bradford Field House on Sundays for indoor training sessions. Rental fees would be \$177 per hour and custodial charges would be \$50.64 per hour on Sundays.

The Racine Youth Sports, Inc., a qualified 501(c)3 organization, is requesting a waiver of rental fees for use of Ameche Field for their youth football program Super Bowls and Pigskin Classic games on Saturday, November 7 and 14, 2009. Rental fees totaled \$900, the cost of lighting was \$100 and cost for the stadium director's salary was \$361.

The American Legion is requesting a waiver of rental fees for use of the Bradford Cafeteria for their annual oratorical contest on Sunday, January 17, 2010. Rental fees would be \$63 per hour and custodial charges would be \$50.64 per hour on Sundays.

Board Policy 1330.2, Charges for Use of School District Facilities defines requirements for outside groups to use school district facilities. Specifically, Policy 1330.2 states that, "...the Board retains the right to waive or adjust any fees associated with use of District facilities."

RECOMMENDATIONS

At its January 12, 2010, meeting, the Audit/Budget/Finance Committee voted to forward all three waivers to the full Board for consideration with the recommendation that District events be given precedence over outside entities.

Administration recommends Board approval of the request from the Kenosha Cyclones Fastpitch Club for use of the Bradford Field House on Sundays with the stipulation that if a school district team or other district entity should need to use the Bradford Field House on a Sunday, our team or entity would take precedence over the Kenosha Cyclones Fastpitch Club. It is also recommended that rental fees in the amount of \$177 per hour be waived, however, it is not recommended that the custodial fees, the \$20 permit filing fee or the possible \$100 clean-up fee be waived.

Administration recommends approval of the request from Racine Youth Sports, Inc. for waiver of rental fees in the amount of \$900 for use of Ameche Field on November 7 and 14, 2009. The cost of lighting, stadium director's salary and permit filing fee would be the responsibility of the organization.

Administration also recommends approval of the request from the American Legion for waiver of rental fees in the amount of \$63 per hour for use of the Bradford cafeteria on Sunday, January 17, 2010. It is not recommended that the cost of the custodial fees, the \$20 permit filing fee or the possible \$100 clean-up fee be waived.

Dear Dr. Mangi:

In 2001, I created the Kenosha Cyclones Fastpitch Club to increase the number of fastpitch softball players from Kenosha and their competitive level of play. Today, we are the largest and perhaps the most successful club fastpitch program in Wisconsin, offering eight teams for girls 8-18 years old. These teams are led by girls from Bradford, Tremper, five of our six middle schools, and many of our elementary schools.

A key to our success is our commitment to indoor training of these players during the winter months. Currently, we train in two single-court gyms at the Boys and Girls Club / CYC Sports Building from mid-November through March. While this space allows us to train individual players on fundamental skills, it seriously restricts our ability to teach team skills. In order to take our program to the next level, I am requesting that you recommend to the Board of Education to allow us a fee reduction or fee waiver for the use of Bradford's fieldhouse on Sundays during that indoor practice season.


The Kenosha Cyclones Fastpitch Club is a registered 501(c)3 organization. The board of directors and coaches are all volunteers who dedicate their time to the players and to the sport. We pride ourselves not only on the opportunities that we provide to the players, but also for the economical fees that we charge to the families to offer these teams.

Typically, membership fees for players are around \$500. For this fee, they receive seven months of training, summer league play, and tournament play nearly year-round. Comparable programs in the region to the Cyclones commonly charge more than \$1000 for the same opportunities. While we want to take another step with our level of training by practicing in a larger space such as Bradford's fieldhouse, we do not want to price local families out of our program. It is our hope that Kenosha Unified would be willing to provide us with a fee waiver or reduction in order to facilitate the use of the Bradford fieldhouse and help us keep our membership fees reasonable for Kenosha families.

I would be happy to discuss this request with you, the Board of Education, and/or other members of your administrative team. Thanks for your consideration, and I look forward to hearing from you.

A review of School Board Policy 4332, Criminal Background Checks was conducted and the Administration recommends changes that are relevant to District practice.

At its January 12, 2010 meeting, the Personnel/Policy Committee voted to forward Policy 4332 to the full Board for a first and second reading. The Committee also requested that Administration look into the availability of grants that would assist in funding more frequent background checks.

The Administration recommends approval of proposed revisions to Policy and Rule 4332 – Criminal Background Checks as a first reading this evening. Policy 4332 will be brought back for a second reading at the Board's February 23, 2010, regular meeting.

POLICY 4332 CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECKS

A criminal background check shall be conducted for all persons recommended for employment as administrators, teachers, other certified employees, substitute teachers, and all other non-certified employees, including but not limited to substitutes, service employees, educational assistants, secretarial/clerical staff, educational interpreters, carpenters/painters, part-time/temporary, miscellaneous, advisors and coaching assignments.

School District volunteers Likewise, a criminal background check shall be conducted on any persons who have District approved access to children in supervised or unsupervised settings (off school district property and/or overnight trips) must also consent to a criminal background check before they will be allowed to come in contact with students. This includes, but is not limited to, volunteers, tutors, mentors and independent contractors.

Information from criminal background checks will not be used or considered in making employment or volunteerism decisions, unless there are past convictions or pending charges that are substantially related to the circumstances of the particular job.

Under the principle of federal supremacy and in accordance with the provisions of federal law requirements, all applicants recommended for employment with federally funded Head Start positions shall be required to disclose information regarding all prior arrests, in addition to convictions and pending charges.

RULE 4332 CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECKS

- 1. The employment application will include a permission form for obtaining crime record information.
- 2. Applicants for federally funded Head Start positions shall complete a separate form detailing all arrests, in addition to convictions and pending charges. If an applicant for a Head Start position discloses that they have been arrested or convicted of a crime, the Office of Personnel will determine whether the nature of the offense or alleged offense precludes the applicant from serving in the position applied for. The Office of Personnel will keep all arrest and conviction record information confidential to the extent authorized by law, and will not disclose same to the interview teams.
- 3. If the person recommended for employment refuses to cooperate in fully completing the form or is found to have provided false, inaccurate or incomplete information on the employment application, the person will be disqualified from consideration for employment or may be considered for dismissal.
- 4. A crime records check shall be made through the Department of Justice for each applicant recommended for employment. The District will reimburse the Department of Justice for this service.
- 5. Persons recommended for employment will be provided a copy of the information from the crime records check upon request. Persons requesting copies of the information will reimburse the District for the cost of providing the copies. Persons recommended for employment may attach any statement or explanation to the report.

RECOMMENDATION FOR WORLD HISTORY COURSE REVISION

Background

At the onset of the 2006-07 school year, committees were formed to develop the kindergarten through twelfth grade social studies curriculum that would be based on standards and benchmarks. The kindergarten through twelfth grade social studies curriculum was approved by the Board of Education in July 2008. Components of the curriculum are grade/course most essential benchmarks, curriculum maps, pacing guides, and unit theme organizers that include most essential benchmarks, essential questions, student knowledge, skills, and essential vocabulary.

From this well-structured curriculum, progress of the full survey world history instruction (prehistory to the present) was monitored by discussing progress on the pacing guide during quarterly Middle School Curriculum Meetings (October 2008, December 2008, January 2009, and March 2009) and at quarterly High School Curriculum Meetings (September 2008, November 2008, February 2009, and April 2009). It became quite apparent as the school year progressed that many teachers were falling behind the pacing guide or rushing through the content to keep current. With the vast scope of covering prehistory to the present, the course focused more on content coverage and less on student skill development.

During the months of December 2008 and January 2009, as Mark Hinterberg visited schools, he had discussions with middle school and high school teachers regarding the scope of the world history content and the possibility of having more focused content coverage at their respective grade level. The first step was making sure the majority of teachers were on board with proposing any change. At the remaining Curriculum Meetings (high school—February 2009 and April 2009 and middle school—January 2009 and March 2009), the grade 7 teachers recommended focusing on ancient world history (prehistory to the Enlightenment); and the grade 10 teachers recommended focusing on the period from the Renaissance to the present.

In May 2009 Mark Hinterberg took the proposed revision to the middle school and high school principals' Connections meeting. The proposal was met with approval from the attendees in the room, and a recommendation was to email the other principals not present at this meeting and get their feedback. All principals were informed of the direction for world history, and no administrators objected to the proposed change.

Current Status

Presently the grade 7 and grade 10 world history mirror each other in regards to covering content from prehistory to the twentieth century. The proposed change would shift from content coverage to student skill development. Addressing less content provides the opportunity to have more in-depth study of a topics via projects, presentations, problem-solution scenarios that in turn engage students and address process standards that develop students' critical thinking skills. Additionally, focusing on less content at grade 7 gives us the opportunity to develop the core values contained in Strategy 5 that has the goal of implementing core values through citizenship education during fourth quarter social studies instruction at grade 7.

Budget Implications

There are no additional costs to pursuing materials for the ancient world history at grade 7 and the modern world history at grade 10. The books and materials will be part of the overall sixth through twelfth grade social studies adoption.

Proposed Timeline

<u>Spring 2010</u>—Recommend purchase of new world history materials that reflects prehistory to the Enlightenment Era at grade 7 and the Renaissance to the present at grade 10

<u>Fall 2010</u>—Implement new world history materials.

Request

At its January 12, 2010, meeting, the Curriculum/Program Committee voted to forward to the full Board the World History course revision as reflected in the course/program revision proposal that grade 7 content coverage is prehistory to the Enlightenment Era and grade 10 content coverage is the Renaissance Era to the present.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the recommendation as noted above.

RATIONALE FOR THE CHANGE

- With our newly developed pacing guides, teachers are struggling getting through all the content. Many teachers feel rushed and are covering large amounts of content with minimal depth.
- The class is more focused on covering content vs. skill development (thinking and reasoning skills, using technology, etc) See Below Skill Development Grade 7 and Grade 10. These are currently being addressed at a minimal level with the large amount of content coverage.
- Addressing less content could provide opportunities for student directed learning and discovery (projects, presentations, addressing 21st Century skills, connecting with other cultures, ePals, ILearn, etc.)
- Our new materials adoption process provides us the opportunity to reflect on our current practice and make changes to approach our subject matter from an "inch wide mile deep perspective vs. a mile wide inch deep perspective".
- Both grade 7 and grade 10 teachers are in favor of the change. I met with grade 7 teachers during the various grade level meetings. Discussed this potential change at the final content meeting and discussed this at our last two high school content meetings.

CHALLENGES/CONSIDERATIONS

- The world history course is a board-approved course. By breaking up the content, do we have to go through a new course proposal process? What was determined when U.S. history moved from grade 11 to grade 8 with grade 8 covering early U.S. history and grade 9 covering later U.S. history?
- Piloting materials. The teacher(s) piloting materials will reflect the change in coverage (grade 7 early world history and grade 10 later world history to present) whereas, the remaining teachers (non-piloting) continue to teach all the units in world history

Appendix # 2 – Research supports the concept of teaching less content & other considerations

Teaching less content supported in the research:

The concept of a more focused course of content is supported in the research. The "mile wide inch deep" quote is taken from the National Research Council, 1999; Stigler & Hiebert, 1999. Their contention is that the "mile wide inch deep" approach is ineffective in producing real learning. Researcher Steven Levy (1996) reminds us "We cannot teach the breadth of the entire world and at the same time achieve any depth of understanding" (p.28). Shutes and Peterson (1994) "In Seven Reasons Why a textbook is not a Curriculum assert "it is...time to recognize that in a curriculum vacuum, textbooks have fostered a preoccupation with content that has made content coverage an end in itself, has made didactic treatment of fact-level information the standard teaching method, and has overwhelmed learners with more information than they could possibly handle. Ironically, the teachers' strategies to cope with excess content may have alienated many of their students not only from the content but from school itself. Shutes and Peterson contend that "Preoccupation with content that has made content coverage an end in itself has overwhelmed learners with more information than they could possible handle (p.12), and Carol Ann Tomlinson in her book Fulfilling the Promise of the Differentiated Classroom states "Students in schools, classrooms, and educational systems that teach less and teach it better score higher on standardized measures than students in schools that seek coverage of massive amounts of information with little emphasis on understanding" (p.59).

Other Considerations: Will less coverage of content hurt WKCE scores?

There are a limited number of questions on the WKCE that address world history. The preponderance of questions address US history or themes in US history that deal with government and politics, economics, and behavioral sciences. Much of the test has students accessing information (charts, graphs, political cartoons, newspaper excerpts, etc.) and asks students to construct meaning, gather inferences, connect relationships, and identify cause and effect. It is these thinking and reasoning skills that we want to foster and develop that in turn over time improve our students abilities to be successful in school, in life, and on the WKCE.

Will less coverage hurt students taking AP World History?

In order to earn a 3 or better on the AP exam, students need to use critical thinking skills and have the ability to articulate their thoughts in writing. Less focus on content will give the instructor more opportunities to develop the students thinking and reasoning skills.

Will this have a negative impact on students taking the ACT or SAT?

The ACT reading test has a Social Studies component where students read a prompt and construct meaning to answer the question correctly. So students are not asked to recall declarative knowledge. As it pertains to the SAT, there is a reasoning component and a language test (verbal and non-verbal), so no social studies. In some instances if a student would be majoring in the social sciences, he/she maybe asked by the college to take a subject specific test in either US history, World history or both.

2008-09 Annual Report Card

Executive Summary

The 2008-09 Kenosha Unified School District Annual Report Card is being submitted by the Office of Educational Accountability to comply with School Board Policy 2110, State Statute 115.38, and the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001. NCLB seeks to raise the bar for school districts be demonstrating adequate yearly progress in meeting the needs of all students. The Kenosha Unified School District (KUSD) is consistently striving to reach academic success for all students at every grade level and is committed to high student performance on all measures of academic achievement.

The Annual Report Card (ARC) disaggregates the following items by student subgroups: student enrollment and demographic information, standardized testing, mobility and stability rates, and other performance indicators (including attendance, suspension, retention, truancy, dropout, expulsion, graduation, Advanced Placement, Youth Options, and Mandatory Extended Year Summer School). The report further summarizes student achievement by NCLB objectives and School Board approved academic indicators.

The reviewer of this report is advised that the data used to report student achievement are time sensitive. For example, enrollment data were based on the official 3rd Friday enrollment count collected every year in September and may have changed since that time. Other data, such as test results, were collected at the time the data were available. In addition, numerous performance indicators were extracted from the SPR (School Performance Report), ISES (Individual Student Enrollment System), and WSLS (Wisconsin Student Locator System), which have been submitted to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) but have not yet been verified. *Therefore, there may be some slight variances in the reported student achievement data when the SPR is returned in its verified form to KUSD*.

Significant Findings

- Hispanic students registered the largest increase in the percent of the total student enrollment, from 10.2% in SY 1998-99 (1,991 students) to 19.8% (4,519 students) in SY 2008-09. African American students also reported a significant increase in the percent of the total student enrollment, from 12.6% (2,461 students) to 16.7% (3,810 students).
- For SY 2008-09, 42.89% of KUSD students were eligible to participate in the federally funded Free/Reduced Lunch Program, an increase of 2.38% when compared to the previous year. (*NOTE: These figures were calculated based on the Official 2nd Friday Enrollment Count on January 9*, 2009.)
- At every grade level, ethnic minority students, economically disadvantaged students, and students with disabilities reported lower percents of students who were proficient or advanced in both reading and mathematics on the WSAS (Wisconsin Student Assessment System) Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination (WKCE) and the Wisconsin Alternate Assessment (WAA) when including only FAY (full academic year) students.



The WKCE/WAA achievement gap between African American and White students decreased in reading at grades 3, 4, 6, 7, and 8, and in mathematics at grades 3, 4, 5, 7, and 10. The gap also decreased for Hispanic students at grades 3, 5, 7, 8, and 10 in reading and grades 3, 4, 7, and 10 in mathematics. The most significant gaps occurred between students with disabilities and not disabled students at all grade levels in reading and math, with the exception of math at grade 3, with the widest disparity in grade 10.




- On the ACT Assessment college entrance examination, KUSD (21.4) continued to outperform the nation (21.1) in the average composite score. White students (22.0), not economically disadvantaged students (22.0), and not disabled students (21.5) exhibited higher scores than the African American students (18.3), Hispanic students (19.8), economically disadvantaged students (19.0), and students with disabilities (15.8). However, African American, Hispanic, and economically disadvantaged students improved their scores by +0.4, +1.8, and +0.7, respectively. The District did not meet its goal of 21.7.
- Average daily attendance for students declined slightly, from 93.6% in SY 2007-08 to 93.4% in SY 2008-09. Additionally, the rates had a declining trend as students progressed from elementary to middle school and again when students moved on to high school. The district did not meet the School Board approved goal of 93.94%.
- The district graduation rate on the SPR as reported from the Wisconsin DPI decreased slightly from 84.1% to 82.9% when this year's results were compared to the previous year. However, the rates increased for African American, Hispanic, economically disadvantaged, and students with disabilities subgroups. The District did not meet its goal of 96.05%.




The District-wide cohort graduation rate increased from 75.8% to 78.6% when "ITED" graduates were *excluded* and increased from 77.4% to 81.8% when "ITED" graduates were *included*. Additionally, all student subgroups reported increases in their rates when compared to the prior school year, both when *excluding* and *excluding* "ITED" graduates. The goals of 90.9% when *excluding* "ITED" graduates and 93.8% when *including* "ITED" graduates were not met.



The number of expulsions decreased in each of the reported student subgroups, with the exception of economically disadvantaged students and African American students, with the number remaining constant. Overall, the number of students expelled from KUSD decreased from 80 students in SY 2007-08 to 45 students in SY 2008-09.



African American students reported the highest suspension rates. Students with disabilities reported the highest retention and truancy rates. African American and Hispanic students reported the highest dropout rates. White, not economically disadvantaged, and not disabled students achieved the lowest suspension, retention, and truancy rates. Students with disabilities had the lowest dropout rate.



Administrative Recommendation

On January 12, 2010, both the Personnel/Policy and the Curriculum/Program committees accepted the 2008-09 Annual Report Card and recommended that it be forwarded to the full School Board for approval. Administration recommends that the School Board review and accept the 2008-09 Annual Report Card. Furthermore, Administration recommends that the Office of Educational Accountability continue to monitor student achievement related to academic indicators and submit the 2009-10 Annual Report Card to the Board in January of 2011.

PRELIMINARY CONCEPT PLAN FOR POSSIBLE FOOTBALL/SOCCER/TRACK STADIUM AT BRADFORD

Background:

During a period from the late 1960's to the late 1970's, the District attempted multiple referenda to build a replacement school for Bradford High School. There were a wide range of proposals from remodeling and adding on to the existing school (now Reuther Central High School), to construction of a new facility, to the eventual solution of adding on to the former UW-Extension building. At various times, the project scope included a football/soccer/track stadium. The design drawings for the Bradford project included a football/soccer field surrounded by a track and the reservation of space for future bleachers as part of an alternate to the base scope of work. That alternate was eventually not included in the final scope of work and a stadium was never constructed for the school. Since that time, there have been on and off discussions regarding the construction of a stadium but those discussions have never lead to anything formal.

Recently, there have been discussions again about constructing a stadium at Bradford because of the new stadium built at Indian Trail and the recent successes of the athletic teams at Bradford, most notably the football team. There are some private parties that have expressed an interest in helping with the fundraising and planning. It was recommended that before any sort of formal discussions take place that the Board be made aware of their intentions and provide authorization for this issue to be pursued even in a conceptual manner.

The land dedicated for athletic fields at Bradford has been fairly well developed especially over the last few years. Installation of a stadium on the campus would require the relocation of quite a few athletic fields and other improvements; therefore, we have had discussions about the possibility of constructing a stadium on the Bullen Middle School property. The District owns 33.9 acres at Bullen including approximately 13 acres of prairie-type space on the south end of the property. An aerial view of the Bullen property is provided as Attachment 1 to this report. A portion of the 13 acres is currently used as an outdoor classroom at the school.

The conceptual plan for constructing a stadium at Bullen would use a fairly sizable portion of the 13 acres along with reconfiguring the athletic fields at Bullen. A portion of the prairie and wooded area could remain as an outdoor classroom if a stadium were constructed on the site. In addition the make-up of the outdoor classroom would probably be enhanced with a retention pond that would most likely be required by the City and State for storm water management

purposes. Attachment 2 is a very conceptual plan of what the stadium and other associated improvements may look like if constructed on the Bullen site.

As mentioned earlier, the Bradford athletics program is asking for permission to explore a possible project including funding sources for a stadium project that would cost an estimated \$5,000,000. In addition to permission to explore the idea, they are interested in knowing whether or not the Board would entertain using the Bullen site including much of the vacant land south of the school as a possible location for a stadium if it were constructed. It is important that everyone involved understand that this is an extremely preliminary concept and that all we are currently asking for is permission to explore that idea. An actual project is neither imminent nor may ever happen. However, Administration feels that it is important that we at least explore the idea since it has been brought up many times over the years and because it is something of great interest to a portion of the population that we serve.

The Planning, Facilities, and Equipment Committee unanimously approved forwarding this report to the full Board at their January 12, 2010 meeting.

Administration Recommendation:

Administration recommends Board approval to pursue a possible stadium project for Bradford High School and its associated fundraising effort. In addition, Board approval is recommended to use a portion of the Bullen Middle School property for this purpose if the funding becomes available.



AGREEMENT WITH CITY OF KENOSHA FOR USE OF ANDERSON PARK SOFTBALL FIELD #2

Background:

Several individuals associated with the girl's softball program at Tremper have talked on and off with the City of Kenosha for the past few years about the possibility of acquiring one of the softball fields in some way to make it the varsity softball field for the school. Administration became involved in these discussions this summer and worked with the Tremper softball people and the City to determine whether an agreement could be arranged. During the discussions it was determined, with a great deal of input from the City Parks Commission, that a lease or an amendment to the existing lease for Ameche Field was not going to be possible. Instead an Agreement was pursued which would allow the Tremper softball program to make improvements at the field known as Anderson Field #2 in exchange for preferential use of the field and other considerations.

An agreement, which is provided as an attachment to this report, was developed by the City Attorney's Office with input from KUSD and our attorney. The key terms of the Agreement are:

- KUSD is guaranteed preferential use of Anderson Field #2.
- KUSD is permitted to sell concessions on the dates of our use of the field.
- There will be no fee charged for the use of the field except for a nominal fee if the lights are used.
- KUSD is allowed to make improvements to the field provided we obtain City approval.
- The City will perform all maintenance on the field except normal infield preparation, and KUSD will perform all maintenance on the improvements we make.
- The City will use one of the softball fields at Tremper for the annual Rotary tournament since Anderson Field #2 will no longer be available for the Rotary tournament.
- The agreement will be a ten year agreement with automatic one year renewals thereafter.

Funding for the improvements will be coordinated and fundraised by the Tremper softball program with oversight from the Tremper Athletic Director and the District Coordinator of Athletics. The Agreement was approved by the City Parks Commission on December 14, 2009 and improvements to the field have already begun. This agreement is not a lease nor are there any financial responsibilities

to the District, but Administration feels that Board approval of the agreement is recommended to formalize the agreement on the District's end.

The moving of the varsity softball field from the Tremper property to Anderson Park will allow for changes in the configuration to the practice football fields which will benefit both the football program and the baseball program. The practice football fields can be configured such that they will no longer overlap with the outfield of the baseball field which will allow for the eventual construction of an outfield fence for the baseball field.

The Planning, Facilities, and Equipment Committee unanimously approved forwarding this report to the full Board at their January 12, 2010 meeting.

Administration Recommendation:

Administration recommends Board approval of the agreement with the City of Kenosha for the use of Anderson Park Softball Diamond #2 as described in this report.

And

KENOSHA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, NO. 1., A Wisconsin Common School District

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF KENOSHA, WISCONSIN, a Municipal Park Commission, duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Wisconsin, having its principal office at 3617 65th Street, Kenosha, Wisconsin, 53142, hereinafter referred to as "CITY", and KENOSHA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1, a Wisconsin Common School District organized and existing under the laws of the State of Wisconsin, having its principal office at 3600 52nd Street, Kenosha, Wisconsin, 53144, hereinafter referred to as "KUSD".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CITY is the owner of parkland located at 8730 22nd Avenue commonly known as Anderson Park;

WHEREAS, KUSD desires to have preferential use of the softball diamond commonly designated as Anderson #2 and generally depicted by the cross hatched portion of the attached Exhibit A, (hereinafter "PREMISES"), located within Anderson Park for school, athletic and recreational programs and services; and,

WHEREAS, it is to the mutual advantage of the parties to enter into this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings, understandings and agreements hereinafter set forth, **CITY** and **KUSD** agree as follows:

1. PREFERENTIAL USE. KUSD shall, prior to the end of the calendar year, submit written notice to CITY of those dates, including rain dates, that it intends to utilize the PREMISES in the following calendar year. CITY agrees that it shall not grant a permit to any third

party for the use of the **PREMISES** in any year other than the year of the application without obtaining prior written approval from KUSD. Should, however, KUSD's request for use be made in the same year as the date of requested use, **KUSD** shall not be entitled to any preference.

- **CONCESSIONS.** KUSD shall, on the dates of its use of the **PREMISES**, be entitled to sell concessions. Any such operation shall be done in a manner consistent with all applicable laws and ordinances. Any profit realized in the sale of such concessions shall be property of KUSD.
- 2. FEES. KUSD shall not be obligated to pay for any permit for the use of the **PREMISES.** KUSD shall, however, pay CITY's standard charge, as established by CITY, for the use of lights at the **PREMISES**. **KUSD** shall pay said lighting fee at the time it requests the date(s) for which lighting is to be required. Should KUSD utilize the lights on a day for which it has not paid for such use in advance, KUSD shall pay the CITY's standard charge within forty-five (45) days.
- USE OF KUSD DIAMOND. KUSD shall permit CITY and/or the organizer of what is commonly known as the Kenosha Rotary Softball Tournament ("Tournament"), the use of one softball diamond situated on the KUSD property commonly known as Tremper High School during the second and third weekend (Friday through Sunday) of July.
- 4. IMPROVMENTS. KUSD shall, at its own cost and expense, be entitled to design and construct Improvements to PREMISES, subject to CITY approving the plans and specifications therefor. (at page 5) All such Improvements, including personal property Should KUSD create fixtures, such fixtures shall become the property of CITY. Further KUSD shall not permit any lien, whether security or otherwise, on the Improvements.
- CONSTRUCTION INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS. Prior to commencing construction of any Improvements, KUSD, shall procure and submit proof of the following insurance coverages to the City Clerk/Treasurer:
- (1) Builder's all At Risk Insurance, with CITY as an additional insured, in the amount of the full value of Improvements insuring against loss or damage during the course of construction, Anderson Park #2 KUSD Agreement

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including material delivered, but not attached to the site; and,

- (2) Liability Insurance protecting **KUSD** and **CITY** from claims for death, personal injury or property damage arising during the course of construction of the Improvements, in accordance with coverage requirements specified in this Lease.
- b. **PERFORMANCE BOND.** The construction of all Improvements shall when required by **CITY** in the application of its policies and practices, be supported by a Performance Bond from the contractor guaranteeing the payment for all labor and materials, and the completion of Work in conformance with the construction contract. **CITY's** Director of Parks shall, within 30 days of being notified of the nature of the Improvement, advise **KUSD** of the necessity of a Performance Bond.
- c. CONSTRUCTION LIENS. KUSD, in making Improvements upon PREMISES, shall not grant permission for or permit any liens for labor or materials to attach to PREMISES without the prior, written consent of CITY, nor allow any condition to exist or situation to develop whereby any party would be entitled, as a matter of law, to file or claim a lien against PREMISES. In order to avoid such liens, KUSD shall promptly pay or cause to be paid all undisputed bills for labor and materials. In the event any involuntary lien attaches to PREMISES, KUSD shall take such steps as shall cause the discharge of such lien within sixty (60) days after the filing thereof, or deposit a like amount in escrow with the City Clerk/Treasurer until the lien is discharged. Nothing contained herein shall preclude KUSD, or its contractor from, in good faith, defending against claims by labor or material suppliers which it believes unwarranted.
- d. UNAUTHORIZED IMPROVEMENTS. Should KUSD, make any Improvements without prior CITY approval, which are not satisfactory to CITY, then, upon written notice to do so, KUSD, shall remove the same, or if agreed upon by CITY, cause the same to be changed, modified or reconstructed to the satisfaction of CITY. In the event any unauthorized Improvement results in an Ordinance violation KUSD shall also timely pay any forfeitures imposed for such violation(s). Should KUSD fail to comply with such notice within sixty (60) days of receipt thereof, or should KUSD

commence to comply therewith and fail to pursue such work diligently to completion, CITY may effect the removal, change, modification or reconstruction thereof, and KUSD shall pay the cost thereof to CITY, upon written demand.

- e. RISK OF LOSS. KUSD assumes the risk of loss or damage to all of the Improvements, whether preexisting or constructed by KUSD, and the risk of loss or damage to all property of CITY arising out of or in connection with the performance of the construction work. In the event of such loss or damage KUSD shall forthwith repair, replace, restore and/or reconstruct the construction work and the property of CITY without cost or expense to CITY.
- f. INDEMNITY AND HOLD HARMLESS BY CONTRACTORS. KUSD shall require its contractors who construct Improvements to indemnify and hold harmless CITY, and their officers and employees against any and all claims, liability, loss, charges, damages, costs, expenses or attorneys' fees, which any of them may hereafter sustain, incur or be required to pay as a result of any act or omission of KUSD, involving the construction of Improvements by reason of which any person suffers personal injury, death or property loss or damage; provided, however, the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to claims, liabilities, losses, charges, damages, costs, expenses or attorneys' fees caused or resulting from the acts or omissions of CITY, or any of their officers or employees. This provision shall survive expiration or termination of the Agreement to the extent necessary to effectuate its purpose.
- g. INSPECTION. CITY shall have the right, but not the obligation, through its duly designated representatives, to inspect the construction work, at any and all reasonable times during the progress thereof, and from time to time, in its discretion, to take samples and perform testing on any part of the construction work, provided the taking of samples and testing shall be conducted so as to minimize interference with the construction work, if such minimization of impact can be accomplished without diminishing the effectiveness or accuracy of the sampling and/or testing. Further, KUSDCITY shall have the right to review and provide approval of completed Improvements and should any Improvements in CITY's sole discretion be completed unsatisfactorily KUSD shall, within thirty (30) days, take all steps

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necessary to correct any deficiencies and obtain CITY's approval.

h. NO CONTRACTOR'S RIGHTS AGAINST CITY. Nothing contained herein shall grant or be deemed to grant to any contractor, architect, supplier, subcontractor or any other person engaged to perform, design or construct work any right of action or claims against CITY, its officers and employees with respect to any labor or materials provided in connection with the construction work.

Nothing contained herein shall create, or be deemed to create, any relationship between CITY and any such contractor, architect, supplier, subcontractor or any other person engaged in any part of the construction work and CITY shall not be responsible to any of the foregoing for any payments due or alleged to be due thereto for any work performed or materials supplied in connection with the construction work.

i. COMPLIANCE. KUSD shall, when making Improvements to the PREMISES, comply with all state and local laws. including, but not limited to, those requiring payment of prevailing wages to contractors.

5. MAINTENANCE. CITY shall be responsible for the maintenance of the PREMISES grass including fertilizing, mowing and trimming. KUSD shall, for the dates it is utilizing the PREMISES, be responsible for all preparation of the infield including, but not limited to, dragging and lining as well as the painting of the outfield foul lines. KUSD shall also be responsible for the maintenance and repair of any Improvements made to the PREMISES, whether in the nature of a fixture or personal property. All maintenance and repair shall be performed in a good and workmanlike manner. Further all maintenance and repair shall be in accordance with relevant federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations including permits and governmental approval where required. CITY shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to require KUSD to maintain or repair any improvements made to the PREMISES in accordance with its direction. In the event KUSD fails to repair the PREMISES as requested by CITY within sixty (60) days or some other mutually agreeable time period, following receipt of written notice, or in the event KUSD, upon commencement thereof, fails to diligently continue to complete any such

work, CITY may, at its option, terminate this Agreement or perform the maintenance or repair and the cost and expense thereof shall be payable to CITY by KUSD, on demand. Furthermore, should CITY undertake any work hereunder on the Improvements, KUSD waives any claims for damages, consequential or otherwise, against CITY as a result therefrom, except claims for damages arising from the CITY'S negligence. The foregoing shall in no way affect or alter the continuing obligations of KUSD as set forth in the Agreement and shall not impose or be construed to impose upon CITY any obligations to care for, maintain or repair PREMISES except as otherwise provided herein.

- 6. GARBAGE PICK-UP. CITY shall provide adequate and appropriate containers for the temporary storage of trash, garbage, refuse, debris or litter on PREMISES. CITY shall also be responsible for the emptying of the refuse containers in accordance with CITY's regular schedule. KUSD shall, for the dates it is utilizing the PREMISES, keep the PREMISES in a clean, neat and sanitary condition, free and clear of trash, garbage, refuse, debris or litter. KUSD shall also remove all trash, garbage, refuse, debris or litter after each use of the PREMISES.
- 7. TOILET FACILITIES. KUSD shall not utilize the toilet facilities located in the pool building at Anderson Park. KUSD shall, instead, utilize portable toilets or the toilet facilities at Ameche Stadium or Tremper High School.
- 8. **WATER**. **KUSD** shall be entitled to utilize the watering system currently in place at the **PREMISES** at no cost to **KUSD**. Should, however, the watering system be modified with the installation of an irrigation system or in some other fashion the parties agree that this Agreement can be amended, at the option of either party, to address the obligation of the parties to bear the cost of watering the **PREMISES**.
- 9. INSURANCE. KUSD shall procure and maintain, during this Agreement, insurance policies as hereinafter specified to insure against all risk and loss on the dates of its use of the PREMISES. The policies must be issued by an insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Wisconsin and licensed by the Insurance Department of the State. KUSD, prior to

executing this Agreement, at the time obtaining dates for use of the PREMISES (and no less than on an annual basis) shall furnish a Certificate of Insurance indicating compliance with the foregoing, including the naming of CITY as an "additional insured", and proof of payment of premium to the City Clerk/Treasurer for approval. The insurance policy or policies shall contain a clause that in the event that any policy issued is canceled for any reason, or any material changes are made therein, the City Clerk/Treasurer will be notified, in writing, by the insurer at least twenty (20) days before any cancellation or change takes effect. If for any reason, the insurance coverage required herein lapses, CITY may declare this Agreement null and void as of the date no valid insurance policy was in effect. Certificates of policy renewals shall be furnished to the City Clerk/Treasurer throughout the life of this Agreement. CITY reserves the right to reasonably increase the minimum liability insurance requirement set forth herein upon furnishing sixty (60) days advance written notice to KUSD, whenever minimum standards of the CITY for all insurance policies comparable to those covering KUSD's operations hereunder are enacted which adopt or increase the minimum insurance requirements, and KUSD shall comply with said request, upon being given such advance, written notice thereof, or be considered in material default of this Agreement. Should KUSD fail to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance coverage, CITY may obtain such insurance coverage and charge KUSD the cost of such insurance coverage plus all appropriate administrative charges and incidental expenses associated with the transaction. The failure of KUSD to take out and/or maintain the required insurance shall not relieve KUSD from any liability under this Agreement. The insurance requirement shall not be construed to conflict with the obligations of **KUSD** in Section 12 of this Agreement. KUSD shall maintain during the course of this Agreement a General Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars per occurrence.

10. SIGNAGE. KUSD shall not place or erect any permanent (a sign standing for thirty (30) or more days) signs on or about **PREMISES** without the prior, written approval of the **CITY** Director of Parks and compliance with the City Zoning Ordinance and Code of General Ordinances.

Should any signs be placed or erected as advertisements for a third party and consideration paid by said third party for the placement or erection of said signs any income derived therefrom shall be the property of **KUSD**.

- 11. USE RESTRICTIONS. The following restrictions are applicable to KUSD's use of PREMISES.
- a. **PREMISES** shall not be used in a manner inconsistent with the deed restriction contained in the December 19, 1967, Deed from James R. Anderson and Janet L. Anderson to the City of Kenosha providing as follows: "In accepting this conveyance, the Grantee hereby assumes and agrees to maintain the above-described **PREMISES** as a public park."
- b. Amplified sound shall not exceed the decibel limit specified in Chapter 23 of the Code of General Ordinances, entitled "Noise Control". Use of a sound system shall be limited to the necessary operations and announcements related to an event. No sound system shall be used during the hours of 10:00 P.M. To 9:00 A.M., daily.
- c. The use will be in compliance with all applicable Federal, State, County and CITY laws, rules and regulations.
- d. The use will not create an unreasonable risk of loss of life, personal injury or property loss or damage, or otherwise threaten the public health, safety or welfare.
- e. The use will not unreasonably interfere with the use of Anderson Park by the general public.
- f. The use is subject to applicable **CITY** licenses and permits, excluding Park Use Permits.
- 12. INDEMNITY AND HOLD HARMLESS. KUSD does hereby agree that it will, at all times, during the course of this Agreement, indemnify and hold harmless CITY, and their officers and employees against any and all claims, liability, loss, charges, damages, costs, expenses or reasonable attorneys' fees, which any of them may hereafter sustain, incur or be required to pay as a result

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of incidents occurring, after the effective date of this Agreement, on PREMISES, or as a result of any operations, works, acts or omission performed on PREMISES, by KUSD, its officers, employees, or representatives, or resulting from KUSD's failure to perform or observe any of the terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement or resulting from any conditions of PREMISES or Improvements thereon by reason of which any person suffers personal injury, death or property loss or damage; provided, however, that the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to claims, liabilities, losses, charges, damages, costs, expenses, or attorneys' fees caused or resulting from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of CITY, or any of their officers or employees in which case CITY will indemnify and hold harmless KUSD and its officers, and employees. Upon the filing with CITY of a claim for damages arising out of any incident(s) which KUSD herein agrees to indemnify and hold CITY and others harmless, CITY shall notify KUSD of such claim, and in the event that KUSD does not settle or compromise such claim, then KUSD shall undertake the legal defense of such claim both on behalf of KUSD and CITY. It is specifically agreed, however, that CITY, at its own cost and expense, may participate in the legal defense of any such claim. Any judgment, final beyond all possibility of appeal, which may be rendered against CITY, or their officers or employees for any cause for which KUSD is liable hereunder, shall be conclusive against KUSD as to liability and amount of damages. This provision shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement to the extent necessary to effectuate its purpose.

2010-11 CAPITAL PROJECTS PLAN

Background:

Board Policy 3711 requires that a major maintenance project list be developed annually by the Department of Facilities Services and that the list be reviewed by the Planning, Facilities, and Equipment Committee and taken to the School Board for action no later than April 1st of each year. This report includes the proposed major maintenance and energy savings projects plans for 2010-11.

The overall major maintenance plan is updated on a regular basis with annual evaluations of each project on the list by the Facilities Department. The plan includes "place marks" for annual-type projects, which include roof, boiler, asphalt/concrete, and carpet replacements. Each project is prioritized by the Facilities Department based on the priority system detailed in the Board Policy. As a reminder, the highest priority projects are 1A followed by 2A, 1B, and 2B. Capacity related projects required to meet the growing enrollment take precedence over all projects except 1A projects. This report also includes the capacity projects for the 2010-11 school year as required by Board Policy 7210.

The 2010-11 capital project plan is provided as the attachment to this report. The plan is a continuation of the overall major maintenance plan initiated nine years ago, and the energy savings project program started seven years ago. The major maintenance plan includes a proposed contingency of \$45,000 or 2.57% of the overall budget. Board Policy 3711 recommends that a contingency of not more than 5% be reserved at the beginning of each year; contingencies have ranged from 0.86% to 4.25% over the past nine years.

The Planning, Facilities, and Equipment Committee unanimously approved forwarding this report to the full Board at their January 12, 2010 meeting.

Administration Recommendation:

Administration recommends Board approval of the 2010-11 Capital Plan as described in this report.

PROPOSED 2010-11 CAPITAL PROJECTS PLAN

Asphalt/Concrete Replacement/Repair:

This is an annual project to replace asphalt and concrete in areas that are in the poorest condition or to better facilitate access to the school site or building. We are proposing one rather large project this year at Lance Middle. The final scope is still being developed but the focus of the project would be to replace and improve the design of the front drop-off area. We are also hoping to have enough funds to go towards a partial replacement and related improvements in traffic flow in the rear parking lot. In addition money in this account is reserved to pay for any City mandated or requested sidewalk or curb and gutter replacements at schools.

The estimated cost for the overall asphalt/concrete project is \$160,000.

Flooring Projects:

We are proposing three flooring projects for this coming summer:

- Carpet replacement with Vinyl composite tile in classrooms at Pleasant Prairie Elementary
- Carpet replacement with Vinyl composite tile in classrooms at Stocker Elementary

The estimated cost of the flooring projects is \$80,000.

Building Exterior Wall Major Maintenance:

The biggest component of this category is payment of a portion of the Reuther Central exterior masonry project. In addition we will be performing some tuckpointing on the gymnasium wall at Somers Elementary

The estimated cost for the overall Building Exterior Wall project is \$615,000.

Roof Replacements and Major Repairs:

This is an annual project to replace the oldest and most troublesome roofs in the District. The roof sections in need of replacement or major repair are determined by the comprehensive roof assessment program that the District initiated nine years ago. The roof sections that will be replaced or repaired in 2009-10 are the gymnasium roofs at Vernon Elementary and Bradford High and over the maintenance shop areas at the Educational Support Center.

The estimated cost is \$525,000 for engineering and survey fees, roofing replacement, and other repair work that will be determined after the spring surveys are completed.

Capacity Projects:

This budget has been reduced from what it has been in the past because the enrollment increases have been lower the past few years. A budget of \$15,000 is being reserved for furniture to handle any additional students.

Locker Painting:

This is also an annual type project and will continue until we are able to get all of the older school lockers painted. We will be painting the lockers at Lance Middle this year at an estimated cost of \$15,000.

Security Projects:

This is also an annual-type project and includes the installation of card access systems and cameras in buildings around the District. The estimated cost of this project is \$10,000.

High School Athletic Field Irrigation Systems:

This is another annual-type project that will continue until we have all of the high school athletic fields sprinklered. This year we intend on continuing work at Tremper High. The estimated cost of the work this year is \$25,000, which will fund the pipe and materials needed for our crews to install the system.

Toilet Room Remodels:

This project includes a complete remodel of the toilet rooms outside the fieldhouse at Bradford and construction of new public restrooms directly west of the cafeteria/commons at Tremper. The toilet rooms at Bradford are original to the building 30 years ago and are the public restrooms for the fieldhouse. The new toilet rooms at Tremper will provide handicapped accessible public restrooms at a location convenient to the cafeteria/commons, auditorium and main gym.

The estimated cost for these projects is \$260,000.

Energy Saving Projects:

There are several energy saving projects planned including lighting retrofits, steam trap replacements, flush valve replacements, etc. We are also looking at using energy saving money to fund additional window replacement projects like the project at Curtis Strange a couple of years ago. We are still developing the final project list. One of the planned projects is the installation of a solar heating

system for the pool at Vernon Elementary. This system is comprised of solar panels installed on the roof and a heat exchanger and piping to heat the pool water. The solar system will supplement the pool heater and has a payback of less than 2 years. The payback was shortened significantly in part to grants from both WE Energies and Wisconsin Focus on Energy which combined are paying for approximately two-thirds of the cost of the project. Vernon was chosen because of the ease of installation, the higher water temperatures maintained in the pool water, the size of the pool, and the fact that the roof is also being replaced this summer. A manually operated pool cover will also be installed as part of the project which has a significant impact on the payback of the project. We will not know the full extent of the energy saving project budget until the end of the fiscal year as these projects are funded by the energy saving programs we have in place.

POLICY 7410 NAMING AN AREA WITHIN OR ON A DISTRICT SITE

The Board of Education shall be the body to approve the official naming of all District facilities. It is not the intention of this policy to initiate the naming of areas within existing facilities or on a District site. However, when a former student, staff or community member who has been deceased for more than two years has achieved national, state or local prominence, the School Board may name an area within a school or on a District site after that individual.

Staff or community members may nominate a name for a specific area within a school or on a District site to the Board of Education. The nomination must include background information and significance to the educational process and cultural significance.

The School Board will request the Superintendent to appoint a broad based committee, which will research the name. When a school is affected by the recommended name, it will be given the opportunity to offer input to the committee. This committee will develop and present to the School Board the process used and the rationale used in making their determination.
