MINUTES

A meeting of the Kenosha Unified Personnel/Policy Committee chaired by Mrs. Coleman was called to order at 5:30 P.M. with the following Committee members present: Mr. Gallo, Mr. Jacobs, Mr. Retzlaff, Ms. Hamilton, Mr. Wamboldt, Ms. Morgan, and Mrs. Coleman. Dr. Hancock was also present. Mrs. Taube arrived later. Ms. Morrison was absent.

Mrs. Coleman welcomed the new student advisor member, Im'unique Morgan, who is a student at Reuther High School.

Approval of Minutes - January 8, 2013 Personnel/Policy Meeting

Mr. Jacobs moved to approve the minutes as contained in the agenda. Mr. Gallo seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

Policy/Rule 6421 – Programs for Students With Disabilities

Mrs. Taube arrived at 5:35 P.M.

Dr. Sue Savaglio-Jarvis, Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning, presented Policy 6421 – Programs for Students With Disabilities and indicated that the revisions in the policy consisted of changing the use of the word "program" to "services", incorporating the services and procedures the District is required to provide by law (policies 6421, 6421.1, 6421.2, 6421.3, and 6421.4) into one policy, and adding a link which would direct individuals to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) for more specific details on mandated services and procedures.

Ms. Susan Valeri, Director of Special Education, was also present and answered questions of Committee members.

Mr. Wamboldt moved to forward revised Policy 6421 – Services for Students With Disabilities and the recommendation for elimination of policies 6421.1, 6421.2, 6421.3, and 6421.4 to the School Board for a first reading on February 26, 2013, and a second reading on March 26, 2013. Mr. Jacobs seconded the motion. Motion carried. Ms. Hamilton dissenting.

Information Items

There were no questions on the Recommendations Concerning Appointments, Leaves of Absence, Retirements, and Resignations.

Mr. Kristopher Keckler, Executive Director of Information & Accountability, presented the Parent/Guardian Survey Results. He indicated that a total of 2,018 surveys were completed which was almost three times the number of responses from the previous survey with most responses being favorable with at least 70% of the responses in the strongly agree or agree

categories in 21 of the 36 questions. Mr. Keckler noted that the results from the survey will continued to be studied by the District. A suggestion was made that the Cleanliness/Safety category not be a combined category in the future.

Mr. Keckler presented the Middle School Class Size Report. He indicated that it was being provided for informational purposes in response to a request by a Committee member. He noted that the classes were categorized into academic, activity, or elective courses for the different middle schools and the numbers were based on the Official Second Friday Pupil Count Day – January 11, 2013.

Mr. Keckler presented the School Year 2013-14 Preliminary Enrollment Projections as contained in the agenda and answered questions from Committee members. He indicated that the projections will continue to be reviewed and adjusted accordingly.

Future Agenda Items

Mr. Keckler indicated that he would provide the High School Class Size Report in March.

High School Class Size Report

The Personnel/ Policy Standing Committee had requested a class size report for elementary, middle, and high school instructors. The elementary steps report was provided at the November 12th, 2012, Standing Committee, and the middle school report was presented on February 12, 2013. The current report displays the individual class sizes for KUSD high school instructional classes. There are three (3) different categories listed for the type of course. Academic courses would include core courses, activity courses would refer to music and PE/ Health, and elective courses cover the remaining options. This report was based on our Official Second Friday Pupil Count Day, January 11, 2013. Due to their multiple programming scenarios, eSchool and Reuther used a more recent date for recording teacher loads.

Notes to consider:

- Comprehensive high school schedules allow for both single (45 min) and double block (90 min) courses. So teacher "A" may only have 4 sections, while teacher "B" may have 7 sections, though the instructional minutes are equal.
- Some high school teachers may have multiple sections during the same period (i.e. upper level World Language, Art).
- There are some teachers who have assignments at multiple buildings, so teachers appear as part-time loads per building.
- Charter schools have specific program formats, but the average class sizes are accurately represented.
- eSchool secondary teachers usually have rolling enrollments in both middle and high school, so their current class average was provided.
- Some Reuther teachers handle shared sections, overlapping for different programs (i.e. AIS, Skillbuilding), so their current class average was provided.

This informational high school report was at the request from the Standing Committee to present specific class sizes.

Approval from the Kenosha Unified School District Board of Education is requested to submit and implement the Head Start Federal Grant for the 2013-2014 school year. The funding for this grant is \$1,999,031. The grant is designed to fund the operating costs of the Kenosha Unified School District Head Start program.

Grant Time Period

July 1, 2013, to June 30, 2014

Purpose

The purpose of the Head Start program is to provide comprehensive services in the areas of health, education, social/emotional development, and parent involvement for low-income preschool children and their families. This grant will service 330 high-risk children that will be 3 or 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2013. Funds will be utilized to serve the children and their families in all program component areas as required in the Head Start Act and through the Head Start Performance Standards.

Number of Students Served

330 eligible Head Start students

Relationship to District Plan and Goals

The Head Start approach to school readiness ensures that families have the skills and knowledge necessary to support development and learning in children. This correlates to the district's Transformational Plan and the following goals:

• Improve student achievement.

- Expand collaborative partnerships with families, community, and industry.
- Secure resources to support learning.

The Head Start Approach to School Readiness means that children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and the transition into kindergarten is effective. Readiness goals are defined as the expectations at children's developmental levels and progress across domains of language, literacy, cognition/general knowledge, approaches to learning, physical health, wellbeing, and motor and social/emotional development. Success in these areas will support each child's readiness for kindergarten.

Fiscal Impact

See the attached Fiscal Impact statement (Appendix A).

Changes in Program Service

The following additional positions have been proposed:

- One full-time equivalent instructional coach
- One-half full-time equivalent family engagement specialist

These positions will be added to better serve Head Start staff and families. The salaries and benefits for these positions will be attributed to the Head Start grant.

Included in this Instructional Coach position will be the responsibilities of the Head Start disability coordinator. The Head Start disability coordinator responsibilities were divided and absorbed by other positions when the previous disability coordinator became the interim principal of the Chavez Learning Station. The responsibilities of the Head Start disability coordinator have proven too involved to be added to other positions. For this reason Head Start is electing to re-establish the role.

A national Head Start current initiative is to build relationships with families that support family wellbeing, strong parent-child relationships, and ongoing learning and development of parents and children alike. The family engagement specialist will support this initiative.

These two positions will strengthen and enhance the Head Start program. The instructional coach will be able to support staff, ensuring that Head Start children receive the very best education. The family engagement specialist will support parents, guiding them toward increased engagement in their child's education at home, school, and in the community.

Evaluation Plan

• The Head Start program meets a community need for the services that it provides. This will be evident through the maintenance of a Head Start waiting list of families that qualify for the program.

- Student outcomes are monitored within the Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework in eight developmental domains. The progress of every child is reported to parents/guardians three times during the school year. The outcomes measured are aligned with Wisconsin Model Early Learning Standards and Common Core Standards.
- Semiannual program report to the policy council and school board to monitor the program
- Program plan report to the Head Start Region V office in Chicago
- Head Start monthly reports (HS 22) to the policy council and school board
- Quarterly calls to the Head Start Region V office in Chicago
- The Head Start program conducts an annual self-assessment in January to determine strengths and areas that are in need of improvement.
- An annual report is available to the community and all stakeholders providing statistics, services, and budget information.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM GRANT APPLICATION

Background

In 2008 Kenosha Unified School District received a federal grant named the Carol White Physical Education Program Grant (PEP Grant). At the time, Kenosha Unified School District received \$839,388 (over a three-year period) that was used to focus on the rebuilding of the physical education curriculum. The money purchased the Sports, Play & Active Recreation for Kids (SPARK) curriculum, equipment for the SPARK curriculum, and training for how to apply the SPARK curriculum. It has recently been announced that this grant is going to be offered again to 75 different school districts nationally who will receive an average of \$479,000 each to improve physical education and health in school districts.

Kenosha Unified School District has ascertained the expertise of a professional grant writer who was the same grant writer that the district used in 2008 when the grant was received. This grant writer, Mr. Mike Russell of Advanced Fitness Solutions, will be paid through the grant should it be awarded to the district and only if the grant is awarded to the district. Advanced Fitness Solutions will analyze all of the data collected through the grant so that a district summary report may be done at the end of the grant term. Kenosha Unified School District's reputation with the federal government and this particular grant writer from the first PEP Grant has targeted the district as a strong candidate for receiving this grant again.

Rationale

In order to continue with the momentum created by the previous PEP Grant, application for funding under the same federal program is preferred. The funding will be used to expand the scope of the current kindergarten through twelfth grade physical education program and provide district students with additional opportunities for physical activity during the school day. Additionally, the type of student assessment that is conducted throughout the district will be expanded by purchasing items such as (but not limited to) pedometers and heart rate monitors. These tools will assess growth and will be used in conjunction with a Web-based system where students, parents, and teachers can monitor growth.

In order to increase the amount of physical activity available to students, elementary classroom teachers will be trained in the delivery of Brain Breaks. Brain Breaks are short five-minute sessions that are delivered in the classroom by academic teachers. During these Brain

Breaks students will be physically active to help improve brain function. Physical education teachers at each school site will help classroom teachers acquire the skills needed to deliver these breaks

In addition to what has been previously mentioned, the Office of Physical Education and Health will work in cooperation with the Office of Food Services to add an important component of this project. The project will provide resources to the Office of Food Services so they can help expand messages related to healthy food choices and eating. The messages will be simple and stay within the guidelines set by the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. An example of this would be purchasing new school lunch trays that have positive nutritional messages written on them.

Finally, the scope of student assessment within the physical education program will be expanded. Student activity levels will be evaluated using available technology, student body mass index (BMI) will be measured, eating behaviors will be measured, fitness levels will be assessed using the same criteria throughout the district, and student attitudes towards physical activity will be measured (sixth through twelfth grade secondary level only). The expanded student assessment will provide students and parents with an accurate picture of the fitness levels and eating behaviors so that appropriate changes can be made.

<u>Note</u>

In 2008, when the Kenosha Unified School District was awarded the PEP Grant the first time, there were no district resources required to be committed. However, a 20 percent inkind match was made. The majority of the matched amount was made through allotted staff time (including a project leader) and time staff volunteered for training. Kenosha Unified School District would again focus on matching their in-kind funds in this similar way.

Further guidelines for the grant will be detailed on February 22, 2013 with a due date for final application predicted to be on April 12, 2013. The deadline for intergovernmental review is June 12, 2013.

Recommendation

Administration recommends that the Audit/Budget/Finance and Curriculum/Program Standing Committees forward the PEP Grant to the School Board for consideration.

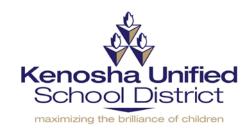

MINUTES

A meeting of the Kenosha Unified Curriculum/Program Committee chaired by Mrs. Taube was called to order at 6:54 P.M. with the following Committee members present: Ms. Stevens, Mrs. Coleman, Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Daghfal, Ms. Santoro, and Mrs. Taube. Dr. Hancock was also present. Mrs. Reed and Mr. Simpkins were absent. Ms. Galli was excused.

Approval of Minutes – January 8, 2013 Meeting

Mrs. Coleman moved to approve the minutes as presented in the agenda. Ms. Santoro seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

Policy/Rule 6421 – Programs for Students With Disabilities

Dr. Sue Savaglio-Jarvis, Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning, presented Policy 6421 – Programs for Students With Disabilities and indicated that the revisions in the policy consisted of changing the use of the word "program" to "services", incorporating the services and procedures the District is required to provide by law (policies 6421, 6421.1, 6421.2, 6421.3, and 6421.4) into one policy, and adding a link which would direct individuals to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) for more specific details on mandated services and procedures.

Ms. Susan Valeri, Director of Special Education, was also present and answered questions of Committee members.

Mrs. Anderson moved to forward the revised Policy 6421 – Services for Students With Disabilities and the recommendation for elimination of policies 6421.1, 6421.2, 6421.3, and 6421.4 to the School Board for a first reading on February 26, 2013, and a second reading on March 26, 2013. Mrs. Coleman seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

Hockey Cooperative Team Expansion

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis presented the Hockey Cooperative Team Expansion and explained that the District would like to expand the co-op hockey program to include Wilmot Union School District; however, in order to do so, the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) requires Board approval before it can act upon the request.

Mr. Steven Knecht, Coordinator of Athletics/Physical Education, was also present and answered questions of Committee members.

Mrs. Daghfal moved to forward the Hockey Cooperative Team Expansion to the Board for approval to expand the District's hockey program into a co-op agreement with Wilmot Union School District. Ms. Stevens seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.

Information Items

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis presented the Kenosha Unified School District – Concordia University Wisconsin Partnership for English as a Second Language Minor and indicated that with the increase of English Language learners in the District, there is an increasing need for teachers to know how to tailor their instruction to increase student achievement in both content and language goals. In response, a partnership between the District and Concordia University Wisconsin has been established to provide staff a pathway to pursue an English as a second Language (ESL) certificate at a reduced cost. Mrs. Iva Plumley, Coordinator of Language Acquisition Programs, was also present and answered questions from Committee members.

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis presented the Elementary Standards-Based Grading: Progress Monitoring and Assessing for Student Learning as contained in the agenda. She explained that the concept behind personalized learning has driven professional educators to recognize the need to assess student learning based on the current newly defined Common Core State Standards. Currently, kindergarten through grade 2 reporting measures student learning by clearly defining standards; however, once a student moves to grade 3, student work is measured by a letter grade which truly has no meaning when one understands the language behind standards-based grading. Ms. Susan Akina, a teacher at Bradford High School, was also present and shared a Standards-Based Grading PowerPoint presentation which included the following topics: What are Standards, and Why Change?, Parents and Students Will Get More Information About:, If You Want to Show Student Growth You Cannot Rely on the 100 Point Scale, 2 Students With a Score of 70, Grading Rubric (Elementary Proficiency Scale), How Does Standards-Based Grading Motivate Students?, and What is the Most Important Difference?

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis presented the Promethean Follow-Up Responses as contained in the agenda. Mrs. Anne Fredriksson, Coordinator of Instructional Technology & Library Media, was also present and answered questions from Committee members.

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis presented the Professional Learning Update Summer 2012 to Fall 2012 as contained in the agenda which included a list of District professional learning opportunities offered, the number of participants in each professional learning opportunity, and a list of both internal and external professional learning facilitators. Mrs. Jennifer Navarro, Coordinator of Organization Training and Development, was also present and answered questions from Committee members. She indicated that an updated Appendix A would be forwarded to the Committee as additional information was received since the report was printed.

Ms. Karen Davis, Assistant Superintendent of Elementary School Leadership, presented the Evans-Newton, Inc. information as contained in the agenda. She indicated that the District entered into a contract with Evans Newton, Inc. to provide professional development and jobembedded coaching for 20 elementary principals and instructional coaches to ensure that professional learning communities were structured to perform at a high level. The remaining elementary principals were already working with Expeditionary Learning and incorporated training related to teacher collaboration around student achievement into additional learning experiences. In these two ways, all elementary principals and instructional coaches have been learning to lead their schools through the process of developing effective teacher collaboration teams that are focused on student achievement. Ms. Davis further explained that Evans-Newton, Inc. is also working with the four District content coordinators from Teaching and

Learning. Their main work is driven around the questions, "What does the teaching of the common core look like in the classroom?" Three pilot schools (Brass, Bullen, and Indian Trail High School) were identified to work very closely with the content coordinators and the common core standards. Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis was also present and answered questions from Committee members.

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis and Ms. Belinda Grantham, Director of Early Education, presented the Head Start Semi-Annual Report as contained in the agenda and answered questions from Committee members.

Future Agenda Items

Dr. Savaglio-Jarvis indicated that she would be presenting an Honors Program Update in March and confirmed that a STEM Update would also be presented in the near future.

A World Language Update and an Extended Year/Year-Round School Update were requested by Committee members.

ATTENDANCE IMPROVEMENT MEANS SUCCESS FOLLOW-UP RESPONSE

Request for Information

This report is provided in response to a request for an update on the Attendance Improvement Means Success (AIMS) program and the truancy numbers for each kindergarten through eighth grade building in Kenosha Unified School District. The request was made at the November 13, 2012, Curriculum/Program Standing Committee Meeting.

Goals of the Attendance Improvement Means Success Program

The AIMS program is designed to reduce truancy for elementary- and middle-school-aged children before poor attendance patterns become ingrained habits. AIMS increases school attendance by focusing on families with emphasis on strengthening the relationship between school and home and resolving obstacles that families may come across on a daily basis.

As defined in Rule 5310 of the Kenosha Unified School District Board Policies Rules and Regulations, an habitually truant student is one who misses part or all of five or more days within a semester without an acceptable excuse. Appendix A identifies 687 habitual truants in kindergarten through eighth grade in the first semester of the 2012-13 school year.*

AIMS can help improve attendance by:

- Eliminating barriers in the way of attending school.
- Educating parents and students on the importance of attendance.
- Offering parenting skills and asset-building workshops.
- Providing community referrals and resources.
- Informing families about Kenosha Unified School District policies/procedures.

^{*} Semester 1 ran from September 4, 2012, to January 25, 2013, for all schools—except Frank Elementary School and Wilson Elementary School. Semester 1 for Frank and Wilson ran from August 6, 2012, to December 20, 2012.

- Advocating for relationships with the school/community.
- Providing youth outreach activities and attendance awards.

Funding

The AIMS program began in the Kenosha Unified School District in fall 2010 and concludes in summer 2013. Grant funding for this program is provided by the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance. The total dollar amount of the AIMS grant is \$224,993. Funds allocated for the program support the following:

- One middle school AIMS truancy specialist,
- One AIMS support position,
- Employee benefits,
- Employee mileage,
- Trainings, and
- Supplies.

Students Currently Served by the Attendance Improvement Means Success Program

Students enter the AIMS program via one of the three following types of referrals:

- Informal—Families voluntarily participate to improve attendance.
- <u>Formal</u>—Families of habitually truant students participate in the program as an alternative to court.
- <u>Self-Referral</u>—Students are referred through another agency or through a self- (parent) referral.

Thus far in the 2012-13 school year, the AIMS program has served 53 students in the Kenosha Unified School District. (See Appendix B.)

- 6. How does the rigor of honors distinction, which requires a quarterly project, compare to honors classes, which met daily?
- 7. How many students signed up for honors distinction and how many actually completed their project for the first and second quarters by subject area and school?
- 8. The honors distinction report should also include a numerical breakdown showing male/female and ethnicity by grade level and subject participation at each of the five regular middle schools.

Presentation of Requests:

- Requests #1 and #3 were combined into one report, as these relate to prior and current year middle school honors enrollments. This report has two versions: number of student enrollments and the percentage of student enrollments.
- Request #2 has no relatable information. Middle school administrators and counselors scheduled students using past practice. No middle school administrator indicated the existence of this scenario for last year.
- Reguests #4, #5, and #8 were combined into one report.
- Request #6 has a response provided by the Teaching and Learning Department.
- A marks distribution report was also included for prior and current year.

- Differentiation occurs in classrooms on a daily basis
- Lessons are extended for all students with this Honors Distinction opportunity
- Projects tap into multiple intelligences while utilizing Blooms' taxonomy to provide an extension to the curriculum.
- More positive and productive communications with students and parents are occurring
- Teachers and other staff encourage all students to take honors
- Teacher and staff from different areas help and support student with a focus on completing honors quality work on a daily basis.
- Increased self-motivation for some students as they work side by side with the teacher and/or others within the building; extended relationships among students and staff
- Allows for meeting the needs of individuals in a more personalized learning model
- Increased number of courses offered for this distinction, Science and Social Studies was added
- Honors Distinction allows choices for parents and students based on readiness and interest
- Presentations by students are high quality, contain rigor, creativity and demonstrates 21st Century Learning Skills
- Improved and increased instructional practice and collaboration that results as teachers design, collaborate, and discuss
- Teachers embed higher-level questions into daily planning for all students, even those not taking the Honors opportunity, which has increased the level of learning
- Increased creativity and interdisciplinary projects
