
Our mission is to protect the integrity of charitable gaming in Wisconsin through regulatory responsibilities that protect the public interest and protect the integrity of games of chance played in the state.

We are responsible for the licensing and regulation of raffles and bingos conducted by charitable organizations. We process over10,500 raffle license applications and various reports for 325 licensed bingo organizations annually. Additionally, we perform on-site operational inspections of bingo events and initiate compliance audits of organizations conducting charitable gaming.

INTRODUCTION

- From ratification in1848 to 1965, the Wisconsin Constitution stipulated that "the legislature shall never authorize any lottery."
- Between 1965-1987 four separate Constitutional amendments were made to modify the strict gambling prohibition.
 - 1965 Promotional Contests
 - 1973 Charitable Bingo Games
 - 1977 Charitable Raffles
 - 1987 State Lottery & Pari-Mutuel ontrack betting

WHO MAY QUALIFY FOR BINGO AND RAFFLE LICENSES

Non-Profit Charitable Organizations

- Religious
- Fraternal
- Charitable
- Service
- Veteran
- ✤ 501c3

Must be in Existence: Raffle – 1 year Bingo – 3 years

WHO MAY NOT CONDUCT BINGOS & RAFFLES

- Individuals or a group of Individuals
- Businesses
- Out of State/National Organizations
- Purely Social Groups

DEFINITION OF GAMBLING

- 1. Prize
- 2. Chance
- 3. Consideration

All three elements must be present to meet definition

- State Lottery

RAFFLE LICENSE CLASSES & TYPES OF RAFFLES

Class A Raffle License
Class B Raffle License

Calendar Raffle (Class A)
Duck Race (Class A or B)

Both license classes are required if you wish to conduct both types of raffles


CLASS "A" RAFFLE LICENSE Tickets are sold in advance of the drawing

\$25 License Fee

- Up to 365 raffles per year
- No Limit on Ticket Price

Class A raffle tickets can be sold up to one year before the date of the drawing.

CLASS "A" TICKET REQUIREMENTS



All 7 elements are required

CLASS "A" REQUIREMENTS

- All raffle drawings must be held in public
- Only a licensed organization can authorize someone to sell tickets
- Price of tickets & discounted price i.e., 1 for \$5 or 5 for \$20
- Age or felony restrictions (alcohol/firearms)

CLASS "A" COMMON ERRORS

- Incentives for sellers
- Early bird drawings
- Missing required information on tickets
- Tickets used for purposes other than a raffle
- Holding Class B raffles under a Class A license

CALENDAR RAFFLES

- Require a class "A" license.
- Calendar format must be preapproved by our office.
- All drawings must be held on the same date as the prizes listed on the calendar.
- One calendar raffle allowed per license year.

CLASS "B" RAFFLE LICENSE Tickets sold and drawing held on Same Day

No Limit on Ticket Price Up to 365 per license year Identical in form and color Does not need to be consecutively numbered Drawings held in public Must be present to win* Drawing Location, Time & **Prize pre-determined** Prizes must be awarded

CLASS "B" COMMON ERRORS

- Exceeding drawings per year limit
- Holding Class B raffles without a Class B license
- Invalid ticket format
- Pre-Sales of Class B tickets
- Using cards or dice to determine winners

DUCK RACE RAFFLE

- Same as a traditional raffle except that winning tickets are determined by numbered rubber ducks crossing a pre-determined point in the water.
- Participants "adopt" a rubber duck by purchasing a raffle ticket numbered to correspond to a rubber duck.
- The ducks, all of equal size and shape, are dropped into a moving body of water and the first duck to cross the finish line wins (subsequent finishers may receive consolation prizes).

MAILING OF RAFFLE TICKETS

Title 18, United States Code, Section 1301 & 1302 prohibits the mailing of raffle tickets, stubs, order forms, and money.

- This also includes private carriers (UPS, FedEx, etc.)

INTERNET SALES OF RAFFLE TICKETS

- Internet sales of raffle tickets is not permitted per state regulations.
- Wisconsin Statutes require pre-printed raffle tickets in which a purchaser enters their name and contact information on the stub.
- Title 18, United States Code, Section 1301 & 1302 prohibits the mailing of raffle tickets and stubs.

BINGO

All organizations conducting bingo games must be licensed by the division.

Each bingo organization must maintain a segregated bingo checking account.

Each licensed organization must file reports & pay occupational tax every 6 months.

Each organization must have a sellers permit & collect sales tax from players.

BINGO Continued

- All profits from operations must be used for proper and legitimate expenditures
- All bingo supplies & equipment must be purchased from a licensed supplier

Only workers with no record of criminal activity can assist in the conduct of bingo
